


PCVS Monthly Newsletter - July 2024

In this issue we are focusing on all things digital inclusion and exclusion. During the pandemic the divide between those with digital access and those without came into stark relief. Those who could access the world online weren't cut off, they could talk with friends and family, access education and some work, they could get health advice, they could access entertainment from quizzes to National Theatre events. On the other side of the divide, were those who did not have access to the digital world because of lack of devices, poverty, meaning there was a limit to data and downloads, knowledge of how and what to do to access the services they needed. In that time, it was easier to hide issues like domestic abuse as the only access to vulnerable people was controlled through a digital window in the home.

Nothing is wholly good or bad. If you are able to access the digital world, you save an average of £650 per year compared to a non-digital contemporary. The health service can see more people, ensure tests and checks are carried out in a timely way, saving the NHS large amounts of money and allowing them to target more expensive face to face contact. However, there is currently fierce debate about online safety and risks particularly to our young people's mental health. And fundamentally, people miss people. In this issue we look at some of the work that has been carried out in our area around digital inclusion. One thing is certain, digital is here to stay. We need to navigate a way to enable the included and to ensure we don't leave those who are excluded for whatever reasons behind.





Connecting Cambridgeshire

Digital Inclusion in Peterborough

Despite the name, Connecting Cambridgeshire is a connectivity, infrastructure, and digital programme operating across both Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, funded by the Combined Authority.

In the modern world, being able to access connectivity and devices, and having the skills and confidence to navigate the online world is more important than ever. According to the Good Things Foundation, 8.5 million people across the UK lack basic digital skills.

Part of Connecting Cambridgeshire's work is to improve broadband, public access Wifi and mobile coverage by supporting the rollout of faster, more reliable, future-proof connectivity across the region. However, we also need to work with communities to ensure they have the ability to thrive in the digital world, by being able to access digital services to realise the benefits that digital can bring to their daily lives.

At the end of May 2024, we launched our <u>Digital Inclusion Delivery Plan for 2024/25</u> setting out six key principles and twelve key ambitions to begin our journey of bringing together partners across the region to create a cohesive, collaborative digital inclusion offer for communities.

This is just the beginning, and we will continue to work to support digital inclusion into the future, embedding our learning and approach into the wider Connecting Cambridgeshire strategy from 2025 onwards.

It's incredibly important that digital inclusion work is relevant to the places and communities we serve. Therefore, we're working with PCVS and Peterborough City Council to deliver bespoke digital inclusion solutions for communities across Peterborough.

To keep our approach specific to Peterborough, we're asking community groups, businesses, and organisations whether they'd be interested in founding a digital inclusion forum for the city.

This forum would give participants a chance to share opportunities, challenges, learning, and support each other. Allowing us to work together to provide better digital inclusion services for our communities.

Following the event our PCVS colleague Clare Barham shared her personal reflections from her time as a teacher during COVID, which I am sure will resonate with many.

"As a teacher in COVID I saw the huge impact of digital exclusion. Many families were limited to just 1 device and some to a mobile phone and the attached data, joining lessons online simply wasn't an option for many children in Peterborough. Initial actions of delivering learning packs (we were already delivering food parcels and checking welfare of our families) just didn't come close to the support children needed as isolation periods extended. Laptops were provided but for many this didn't solve the issues for those without Wi-Fi and Wi-Fi dongles were needed to provide services. I watched my own children reducing isolation with what's app chats, online games and video calls, knowing there were many children isolated from their friends and communal learning experiences waiting for digital solutions. We knew many families did not have lots of devices, we knew some

struggled to pay bills and may not always have internet or data. Until COVID I didn't think of laptops and phones as essential items, I still considered them luxury items. A world unprepared for isolation highlighted that a digital platform for learning and accessing multiple services and filling endless forms is not a luxury, it's essential and something everyone needs. The world has not returned to pre-COVID digital use, the pandemic highlighted the efficiencies of online working increasing the number of job opportunities accessed by online interviews, NHS attend anywhere and telephone/digital GP services are increasing rapidly. Sharing devices is restrictive, it adds pressure to busy lives and makes learning opportunities for adults and children difficult. The future is very hopeful though with new digital strategies being developed by the combined authority and increasing social enterprise to ensure more tech is refurbished and reaches those in need"



The Joy Project started in November 2023 led by Anna Ghossh and runs for a year, to date she has made great strides in raising awareness of this functionality, demonstrating its benefits, arranging training and signing up new users.

The key objectives are outlined below:

- The JOY Project aims to raise awareness and uptake of the JOY digital and How Are You Peterborough platforms which are key local signposting tools and knowledge hubs of local provision across sectors.
- Encouraging self-referrals, increasing digital literacy, providing training and infrastructure support to VCS organisations are at the core of this project.
- We hope to identify emergent health inequalities through our mapping exercise, surveys, training sessions and in-person engagements, thus creating more funding opportunities for the VCS sector.

Healthwatch Cambridgeshire Peterborough Community Researchers Digital Inclusion project

What is the impact of digital inclusion?

We live in a digital age. As health and care services continue to adapt and harness the benefits that technology can bring, our digital inclusion survey investigated how this shift is impacting service users. The aim was to gather insights to inform future service improvements, thus ensuring a more inclusive and accessible healthcare environment for all.

The survey revealed the level of access to technological devices and use of online services to access healthcare services. Key points raised included:

- · Respondents expressed a preference for services that combine digital, telephone, and face-to-face interactions.
- · Respondents called for training in using digital services, particularly for older people and those less confident in using online platforms.
- · Respondents requested quicker responses and simplified processes, such as reference numbers for follow-ups and straightforward systems for booking appointments.

"Give people a choice over the way they want the service provided. It could be a mixed model of digital, telephone, and face-to-face, but ultimately it should be down to the individual to choose how they'd like to receive their care." Our recommendations, based on the finding of this survey, include taking steps to increase public awareness of digital services, making digital platforms more user-friendly and flexible, and improving accessibility for people with disabilities.

The survey highlighted the need for a digital inclusion to be widened across communities and address the diverse needs and preferences of our local population

What difference did this make?

- · The North Care Partnership will consider those who cannot use or don't have access to digital services in their work moving forward.
- \cdot A PPG in Huntingdonshire have organised NHS App training day in collaboration with their Integrated Neighbourhood.

The remit was clear, as was the presentation style. Sara contributed to the discussions and her ideas were heard. It was structured yet informal and the warmth in the room made it feel very relaxing. There was unanimous agreement that visitors hours should be longer and more flexible to meet the needs of many people with challenges."

Nearly 1,500 free summer school holiday activities available to eligible families

From football and gymnastics to arts and crafts, there are a whole host of activities available for school age children during the forthcoming school holidays.

The Summer Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) programme aims to provide enriching activities and healthy food for primary and secondary school-aged children, including those with special educational needs and disabilities, who are in receipt of free school meals. Bookings are now open.

The aim of the programme is to enable children to be active over the school holidays, eat healthily, and learn more about health and nutrition. It also gives children the chance to take part in fun, engaging and enriching activities.

During the Summer school holidays, eligible children can access up to 16 four-hour sessions at no cost to their family. Children and young people must live in Peterborough or attend a Peterborough school. The sessions include a variety of exciting activities and a healthy meal.

John Gregg, Director of Children's Services, said: "There are many different activities on offer throughout the Summer holidays for children of all ages.

"We have nearly 1500 sessions available across 45 venues. Children will be provided with healthy food and activities and will be able to socialise with other children and give them the opportunity to try out new things. If your child is eligible, I'd encourage you to have a look what is on offer near you.

"If you have children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), have a look the website and call those providers you are interested in to see what they can offer you and your child or email the HAF team who can help."

The new Tiger bus pass is free of charge and designed to make public transport more affordable for young people, helping them travel to school, college, training, work, shopping, and social activities.


This initiative is part of a broader effort by the Combined Authority to revamp public transport in the region.

How to Apply for your free Tiger bus pass is simple and quick:

- 1. Visit the application site: Apply for your Tiger pass
- 2. Upload a photo and proof of age.
- 3. Receive your Tiger pass free of charge a credit card-sized, tiger-branded card that's easy to recognise and use.

Just show your Tiger pass to the bus driver when boarding to enjoy the £1 fare. Without the pass, you won't be eligible for the discounted fare, so make sure to get yours today!
