

Peterborough City Centre



James Farson, one of PCVS leads for the Poverty Truth Commission, reflected on the links between the project and how things have developed in Peterborough over the last 50 years "There's a conversation I've had to have with people on what feels like a continuous loop for the last year and a half. In it, they ask me what a Poverty Truth Commission hopes to achieve in such a short span of time and up against such huge societal issues, and I reply that it's as much about establishing a way of working as it is anything else, and that one of our mentors once said that we plant things we may not see grow in our lifetimes.

I've been thinking about this while doing some reading on Peterborough's history. People who moved into the new estates in the '70s were often moving into a house surrounded by mud as far as the eye could see. The Development Corporation recognised that with all the new building, new parkways, and new industry, there'd need to be a concerted effort to make it look nice. The corporation maintained a tree nursery in Castor, and during the '70s were planting up to 12,000 trees, bushes, and shrubs per year in Peterborough1.

And just look at it now. Some of it was pragmatic, sure; the residential areas needed shielding from the parkways, but there was beauty too. They deliberately remodelled Long Causeway and Bridge Street to make it a green axis along the city centre. And then there's

I look at the greenery around Peterborough now, walking down that green axis through the centre on my way to work, and I'm reminded that it's possible to make long term policy decisions to improve people's lives.

Peterborough Green Wheel



Next year will see the Green Wheel celebrate its 25th anniversary. If you have not experienced it, give it a go whether on your bike or by foot, its a wonderful experience providing traffic free access to many of Peterborough's attractions and wildlife.

The Green Wheel network of cycle routes provides over 45 miles of continuous sustainable routes around the city. It was one of the first large scale projects <u>Peterborough</u> <u>Environment City Trust (PECT)</u> delivered for Peterborough and first opened in 2000.

The Green Wheel threads through picturesque scenery, including woodland, lakes and rivers, nature reserves and pretty villages, where riders will find plenty of country pubs serving excellent value food and other refreshments. Information boards provide notes on the history and natural habitat of each area.

Not only does the Green Wheel contribute to a sustainable transport system, it also celebrates over 3,000 years of social, cultural and economic history through colourful interpretation boards and a series of sculptures. This £11 million project was 50% funded by the National Lottery through the Millennium Commission, matched by contributions from public and private businesses and voluntary organisation.

Growing a healthier future.

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Peterborough-based sustainability charity PECT has been lending growing towers to local schools since 2021. The popular scheme is part of <u>Food Smart</u>, the charity's programme to encourage healthy eating in schools.

PECT believes growing food is a great way to show students the benefits of local and organic produce for their health and well-being, as well as where our food comes from. But not every school has the space or time to set up and maintain a veg plot, however, this is where innovative growing towers come in. They are small enough to fit in the corner of a classroom and can be used to grow plants indoors all year round.

What's more, there's no need for messy soil. Instead, plants are suspended in net cups and are fed by a nutrient-rich water solution. Four LED grow lamps on a timer, provide artificial sunlight. Similar systems are already used to grow salad crops commercially, and in classrooms across Peterborough, growing towers are sparking important conversations about nutrition, plant biology, and the future of food production.

How to borrow a growing tower

Any school in or around Peterborough can apply to borrow a growing tower for free. Seeds and plant feed are also supplied, along with instructions, lesson plans, and teaching resources. PECT still has two growing towers available to borrow for the summer term 2025 and is now taking bookings for the 2025–26 academic year, with more towers on the way. Frailty

Healthy Green Orton sees local charity, PECT working in partnership with Nene Valley Hodgson Medical Practice & Peterborough City Council (PCC) to introduce a Green Social Prescriber into the local community.

Social prescribing is a healthcare approach that connects patients with non-medical activities to improve their overall wellbeing. Instead of solely relying on traditional treatments, social prescribing encourages participation in community-based activities such as gardening, yoga, art therapy, or volunteering. By engaging in these activities, participants can reduce isolation, boost confidence, improve wellness and, create meaningful connections within their communities.

Funded by the Healthier Futures Fund, and PCC, the new initiative builds on this approach by focusing specifically on nature and environmentally based activities. As part of the project, a new green social prescriber will join the existing team at Nene Valley Hodgson, to provide tailored support for individuals with frailty and chronic health conditions. This method aims to enhance both physical and mental health by integrating patients into their communities and promoting a more active, engaged lifestyle.

As part of the project, we are looking for local green activities and groups like wellbeing walks, community gardens, outdoor yoga, litter picking, or tree planting, to add to a database of upcoming events. Post election engagement

On Thurs 25th July, 20 voluntary and community sector leaders gathered to listen to and discuss what the new era or life under a labour government might mean for us. The event was organised by Anglian Ruskin University (ARU) with presentations by Andy Brady and Nicky Stevenson from the University. Also presenting was social entrepreneur Craig Dearden-Phillips.

Although at the time it was only a couple of weeks since the election and there were still a lot of unknowns, there was analysis of Labour's manifesto and the initial appointments and actions of the new government, and what that might mean to us working in the sector.

Since that meeting we have had the new Charities Minister confirmed as Stephanie Peacock (see below).

2025 European Club Goalball Champions League Qualification Stage to be held in the UK following successful local hosting bid

The Cambridgeshire-based Fen Tigers goalball club is delighted to have bid successfully to host the first qualifying round of the EGCA^{*1} 2025 European Club Goalball Champions League (goalball's equivalent of football's UEFA Champions League). From 21st until the 23rd February the tournament is coming to the UK and matches will take place at the Oundle School Sports Centre near Peterborough. It is the first time the Champions League has been held in the UK and the event is being supported by Goalball UK, the sports' National Governing Body.

Goalball, a game for people with visual impairments, was invented in 1946 by Austrian Hanz Lorenzen and German Sepp Reindle to help with the rehabilitation of blinded war veterans. Since then, it has evolved and made its men's Paralympic debut in Toronto in 1976, with the women's event launching at the games in New York in 1984. There are now over 30 goalball Clubs in the UK, covering all regions. March-based Fen Tigers was established in 2016 and became the first British club to participate in the Champions League in the 2022 season. The highly successful and very active club is making history once again by hosting the first-ever EGCA Champions League tournament in the UK.
